





**PURPOSE:** To update the Petersburg City Council about the City Partnership with the Schools, an exciting collaboration that is designed to improve student outcomes for Petersburg's children and youth.

**REASON:** City and state agencies, along with Petersburg City Public Schools, have been collaborating since September to design a sustainable interagency structure that will maximize resources and positive outcomes for students. This spring, the City Partnership with the Schools has begun a strategic planning session and would like to inform the City Council about its progress and solicit feedback to inform the collaboration as it grows.

**RECOMMENDATION:** The City Partnership with the Schools would like the City Council to acknowledge, support, and advocate for this initiative to be a longstanding collaboration that will galvanize city and school agencies to work together to improve the lives of Petersburg's children.

**BACKGROUND:** The City Partnership with the Schools is an interagency collaboration co-chaired by the Superintendent and City Manager. The Partnership has brought together schools and city agencies with the shared goal of increased student attendance. Because some of the challenges facing Petersburg require additional political, human, or financial resources, the Virginia Governor's Children's Cabinet, and its respective state agencies, are collaborating with the Partnership at the direction of the Superintendent and City Manager.

To realize the goal of improved attendance, there are five work groups co-led by a state and local leader:

- 1) **Healthcare**
  - a. To improve sustainable access to high quality physical and mental healthcare for Petersburg students so they come to school ready to learn
- 2) **Nutrition**
  - a. To increase access to healthy year-round food for Petersburg children and families

**3) School Climate**

- a. To transform students' systems of social and emotional support so they come to school ready to learn

**4) Housing**

- a. To create a sustainable system to rapidly identify homeless (or at-risk of homelessness) students and stabilize their families

**5) Out-of-School Opportunities**

- a. To reduce holiday associated stress through positive resources for students and families over school vacations

# Meeting Schedule

- Monthly City Partnership with the Schools meetings:  
These are large citywide meetings led by the City Manager and Superintendent. There are over 50 participants from across local and state agencies. During these meetings, the work groups present their progress and troubleshoot challenges with fellow local agency leaders.
- Monthly Steering Committee meetings: These meetings are an opportunity for senior leadership to guide the Partnership and examine the work group plans, consolidate areas of overlap, and identify gaps.



# Progress of the Work Groups

## School Climate Work Group

- Received funds from Virginia Department of Social Services for four additional social workers in schools
- School climate survey conducted in grades 7 – 12
- Completed CDC Youth Risk Survey to grades 6 – 12 in February
- Planning to re-establishing an out-of-school suspension program

b. EMS Services in the City of Petersburg

**BACKGROUND:** Southside Virginia Emergency Crew has been answering EMS calls for the City of Petersburg since 1945. Until July 2014, SVEC was responsible for all EMS calls in the City of Petersburg from our location at Graham Road. Petersburg Fire Department took over Stations 3 & 4 at that time and has been running EMS to present day with assistance from SVEC. SVEC currently has equipment and staff to run all 3 stations under current funding from the City of Petersburg.

**RECOMMENDATION:** No action required.

J. Tolleison Morriss, President of Southside Virginia Emergency Crew Board of Trustees, gave an overview of the proposal presentation from the Southside Virginia Emergency Crew.

c. Fire Department EMS Proposal Presentation

**BACKGROUND:** In July 2014, the Fire Department deployed an advanced life support medic unit from Farmer Street fire station to address Southside VA Emergency Crew's delayed response times to the western corridor of the City. This was also done to augment SVEC's down staffing of a medic unit due to budget reductions. The staffing and deployment of Fire Medic 3 (Farmer Street) along with the Fire Medic 4 (Sycamore Street) recognized an increase in the return of spontaneous circulation (ROSC) of patient's transported, which leads to increases in patient survivability. The Fire Department is proposing a deployment of fire medic units from all four City fire stations which will provide even greater positive patient outcomes. This proposal is recommended as a collaborative effort with SVEC with the caveat that the Fire Department becomes the lead EMS agency for the City of Petersburg.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Review and discuss Fire Ems proposal.

Fire Chief T.C. Hairston introduced Deputy Fire Chief Brian Sturdivant.

Deputy Chief Sturdivant gave a brief PowerPoint presentation on the Fire Department EMS Proposal.

Chief Hairston stated some brief points on the PowerPoint presentation.

He asked what the market value is and when was this done and also by whom. He stated that basically the City is handling real estate transactions and have been doing so for the last 40 years and that this has been a joke.

Seeing no further hands, Ms. Jackson closed the public hearing.

There was discussion among City Council and staff.

Council Member Hill made a motion to table action on the public hearing until further investigation is done by the Chief Operating Officer. The motion was seconded by Council Member Moore. The motion was approved on roll call. On roll call vote, voting yes: Coleman, Hart, Hill, Moore, Wilson-Smith, Parham and Myers

8. **PUBLIC INFORMATION PERIOD:** The Public Information Period is established by the Rules of Council to hear input from City residents or owners of businesses in the City. It will last for a maximum of 30 minutes. Speakers will be called in the order that they have signed up to speak. If there are ten or fewer speakers, each shall speak for a maximum of 3 minutes. If there are more than six (6) people desiring to speak, the time allotted to each person may be adjusted or the number of speakers limited to meet the time limitation. A speaker may speak on items **except those that are listed on tonight's Council agenda.** Any matter brought before the attention of the City Council during the public information period will not be acted upon by the City Council at this meeting.

Willie Noise, 1508 Circle Drive, stated that there is a saying that he read on the wall in the Petersburg Public Library. He stated that it stated that the first Petersburg Librarian was in 1924, who was Teresa D. Hodges. He stated that a successful democracy must put forth years of enlightenment and stimulation to independent thought based on information in the hands of its citizenship. He stated that he wants someone to do the old business. He stated that there were some things on the docket before all of this got started.

Thomas Chambliss, 321 Cross Street, stated that he is speaking on 401 High Street in regards to the farm that the City has been fighting over with the donkey and sheep. He stated that he wants to invite everyone to sit on his front porch at 321 Cross Street tomorrow and smell the filth coming from the farm. He stated that it has been held under the table for too long and that it is time for a couple of them to come and see what the complaints are about.

Cory Harris, 2316 Anderson Street, stated that he has been in the City for a long time and that he has never seen a City so divided. He stated that this is ridiculous. He stated that everyone has individual agendas for selfish reasons. He stated to City Council that when they are in their seats there is no color. He stated that they are to serve everyone. He stated that there is no republican or democrat. He stated that it is only Petersburg. He stated that somehow City Council Members cannot get that. He stated that he is concerned about a 47% childhood poverty rate in the City. He stated that he is concerned about people that have been out of work for years. He stated that it is ridiculous. He stated that the funny part about the entire ordeal is that they matter not City Council. He stated that the citizens are more important than City Council's agenda. He stated that they should focus on what is important.

Ken Pritchett, 1113 Overbrook Road, asked can City Council suspend the Rules of Council and give at least two minutes to each person to speak. He stated that it is great to see all the citizens at the council meeting. He stated that he hopes that they keep coming in the future. He stated that he wants to speak on the Farmer's Market but that he does not have the time to do so. He stated that the City has virtually destroyed the Farmer's Market. He stated that they brought people downtown every weekend. He stated that he would like to see them as City Council Members to take this as their goal to reestablish the Farmer's Market as it was. He stated that all the vendors were bolted when the announcement was that they were going to lose this property. He stated that he would like to know who the person was that was intended to buy the property that caused them to stop the Farmer's Market before the season was over. He stated that he would like to see the Farmer's Market back where it was before it was where it is now. He stated that if they need to expand then they can expand it to the yellow brick road across the street. He stated that he hopes that City Council gets the message and act quickly and put some of these vendors back.

Barb Rudolph, 1675 Mount Vernon Street, stated that she would like to bring up what is in the City's Code of Ethics. She stated that in "Section 1" it speaks of responsibilities of public service. She read, "City officials and employees are obligated to uphold the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Virginia and to comply with federal, state and local laws and policies. Recognizing the special responsibilities of serving the City and its citizens and customers, City officials and employees are required to maintain high standards of integrity and honesty. They are expected to treat all members of the

public and fellow City employees with respect, courtesy, concern and responsiveness. The conduct of City officials and employees in both their official and private affairs should be above reproach to assure that their City position is not for personal gain." She stated that she is asking them to just look in the mirror.

Janell Sinclair, 1644 S. Sycamore Street, stated that she is present because Monique Williams asked someone to be the voice to the voice list. She stated that she will be speaking. She stated that she wanted to speak. She stated that she is not opposed to low-income housing or developers coming to the City to revitalize the community. She stated that she is not opposed to providing families with affordable housing. She stated that she is opposed to the leaders being seduced with projects and promises while intentionally ignoring the sore spots that plague the City. She stated that currently Stainback Street Apartments in Ward 6, Commerce Street Apartments in Ward 5 and Dunedin Apartments in Ward 7, which is currently less than 50% occupied, can be brought and refurbished with the same low-income tax credits that the City is doing for other new projects. She stated that they are not going to let the City ignore them as they have been ignoring these properties. She stated that they are not going to let them deteriorate as the apartments have been doing for years. She stated that they are residents that have become revitalized in their allegiance to the City and they ask that they be refurbished to see their short sightedness to their wards that the developers can some whisper sweet nothings in your ears. She stated that City Council Members should stand up for their wards and the City and do what is right.

Ben Greenbaum, 134 South Adams, stated that he and his wife have lived in the City for nine years. He stated that he and his wife have both become concerned about the City's leadership. She stated that it is a wonderfully diverse and historic City and yet in light of the many significant and very damaging problems that now confront Petersburg he would ask them to consider a few things that he suggests. He stated to City Council to please represent all the citizens and to keep all of them open in transparency and informed regarding any upcoming financial issues or problems. He stated to City Council to be open to constructive criticism and analysis offered by concerned citizens. He stated to City Council to also be forthcoming when questions are posed by the press and not refuse to comment when asked an important reasonable question. He stated to be responsible about financial crisis. He stated to be considerate of taxpayers when deciding to attend conferences that have devious impact on the betterment of the City. He stated also with regards of spending money on expensive hotels instead of better housing.

Jon Ceffalia, 25620 Simmons Avenue, stated that he would like to ask if it would be possible to start a program to certify himself or other people to volunteer their time and services to help stop people from parking illegally. He stated that he has an issue of people parking in handicap spaces without certification, a sticker or license plate with handicap on it. He stated that he has taken several pictures of people parking in the handicap spaces and that he also would like to know if it is possible or become certified to take pictures of cars in illegal parking spots and certify them to the town or police department for summons. He stated that this would be to control this issue. He stated that he was very embarrassed by a person that pulled up next to him in a handicap spot. He stated that the person was coming out of Dunkin Donuts and that he had parked next to him. He stated that he spoke to the person and told them that this is a handicap parking space. He stated that the guy responded asking what is it to him regarding the space. He stated to the guy that he is handicap and that if he needed the space he would not be able to park. He stated that the guy laughed at him and gave him the finger. He stated that he was mortified about the issue. He stated that he took a picture of the guy's car.

Mayor Myers asked Mr. Ceffalia to bring his comments to a closure.

Ida Edwards, 30 Corling Street, stated that she is a concerned citizen and tax payer. She stated that she has been before City Council Members before. She stated that there are so many things that she can speak about but in the essence of time she will speak on one issue. She stated that this issue is regarding the animals that are adjacent to her property. She stated that she was present before when there was a decision made that they should be moved. She stated that it has been two years in the past and that they have not been moved or taken away. She stated that she is in favor of the Pradia's and that she opposes the animals. She stated that she would not like to have animals held by her home or anyone else's home in the City of Petersburg. She stated that if they would like to do this there is the country in other areas adjacent to

Petersburg on the outskirts. She stated that for health reason, personal reasons and economic reasons she opposes this. She stated that she wonders why they cannot hold the people accountable who are breaking the law and not agreeing with the rules. She stated that they say it costly and she agrees that it is costly when they keep repeating the same mistakes over and over again. She asked why not hold their word. She stated that their word is their bond. She stated that if they say that they should move then they should move. She stated that the family should not have to tie up their funds and time to seek legal results when you have a City with City Council and a City Manager to take care of these problems. She stated that she does appreciate the fact that they are working on this but that this is way too long.

Leonard Curry, 2014 Woodland Road, stated that nearly one million dollars were giving in salary increases to 16 individuals in a year when the salaries were frozen for teachers. He stated that these increases are about 1/12 of the deficit. He stated that it is a half million bucks. He stated that he hopes that they look at these salaries and pull some back. He stated that some of the pay increases were \$40,000. He stated that the City now has nine people making more than \$100,000 a year. He stated that five years ago there was only one person, the City Manager. He stated that the Census Bureau says that the average family income in Petersburg is \$29,000. He stated that yet the City awarded \$40,000 in pay increases to certain individuals. He stated that many people got a 50% increase. He stated that he has a list of salaries that City Council can look at.

Perita Pradia, 517 High Street, stated that she is before City Council again with the same concern. She stated that she owns the Destiny Inn Bed & Breakfast. She stated that they have been talking in conversation about how animal manure lays out in open. She stated that there has also been conversation on how they have animals that reside directly behind their property for seven years. She stated that she and her husband also purchased 541 High Street this past June. She stated that they have worked tirelessly preparing their property for renters to move into the property. She stated that this past weekend she showed the property to a renter and he heard the sound of the donkey and he decided that he did not want this particular property. She stated that this is absolutely a shame. She stated that they have put their time and investment of dollars into their business the Destiny Inn Bed & Breakfast but that they have also taken upon themselves to rebuild and revitalize some of the historic homes in the community. She stated that it is such a shame that council has not did anything for the last couple of years. She stated that the City ordinance states this ordinance that should be enforced. She stated that she stands in front of them again to ask them to enforce their ordinance.

Pamela Pena, 1692 Fairfax Road, stated that she would like to ask the matter of the City Attorney illegally charging her for asking questions at a public council meeting been resolved. She stated that she was told that it would be taken care of. She stated that she would like to put this to rest as the City Attorney has been spreading rumors about the situation to others instead of speaking to her directly in writing just as she has with him. She stated that she would also like to ask why is the trash collection part of the utility bill not itemized on the estimated statement. She asked whether it is being paid and up-to-date. She stated that this is a set fee and that this is something that should be allocated already and shown on the statement while the City takes care of the water issue. She asked can someone look into and follow-up on the changing of the website so that a person does not need the account number to pay utility bills. She stated that she is asking this because if you do not get a bill and you are going to pay you do not have your account number to be able to pay. She stated that something like a social security number would suffice. She asked whether a payment plan has been made to get the school board its funds owed. She asked can an estimate be done to see how much it would cost to have the Cameron Field revamped. She asked is it possible to have local events posted on the City's website and if so who would a person speak to regarding this matter. She asked whether it was true that there was a lawsuit regarding certain law officers not being paid overtime. She stated that if this is so what would be the outcome for this. She thanked City Council Members for her time and requested that these answers be provided at the next City Council Meeting. She stated that if she needs to be charged for this can they explain prior to responding.

Karen Graham, 402 High Street, stated that she is present to ask that City Council put forth to the public how they plan on advertising and proceeding with hiring a new City Manager. She stated that given that the Chief Administrative Officer Committee is only in place for 60 days. She asked City Council have they started advertising for this position and if not when do they plan on advertising. She asked do they plan on

hiring a consultant again to begin with the selection process. She asked will there be citizen input in the hiring process. She stated that in the February 2, 2016, minutes under the public information section the bills for the January – February period were supposed to come out in March and that she is yet to receive her bill. She stated that they are supposedly due the 25<sup>th</sup> of this month and that this is giving people ten days to pay. She stated that they have not had a Ward 5 meeting in a long time. She stated that she keeps seeing all of the other council members scheduling ward meetings. She stated that it would be nice to have one. She stated that she is a proponent of the gentleman that spoke on the salary increases that some employees received. She stated that she is also a proponent of the animals on High Street. She stated that this has been an issue that has been going on far too long. She stated that she lives a block away and that there is no odor and that they owners really keep the property up well. She stated that those that do complain do not live in the area or on High Street.

Vernel Gannaway, 652 Old Wagner Road, stated that he is born and raised citizen of the City. He stated that he would like to mention two things. He stated that he thanks the Senator for being present because she would remember back in 1998 it was a proclamation that was given to City and that he had given each Council Member a copy. He stated that the copy was given to the older City Council Members. He stated that it took three years to bring prayer back to the chambers. He stated that he is not going against people religious beliefs but that he believes that a lot of the things that are happened would not happen if they had prayer. He stated that he would like to leave City Council Members with two things. He stated that those two things are righteousness and religious. He stated that there is a difference between the two. He stated that if you are on religious you will have greed, division, selfishness and other things. He stated that it is time for the City to get real.

**BACKGROUND:** Petersburg City Council previously approved a letter of intent from the Woda Group to purchase properties in the Halifax Triangle. The Woda Group responded to a request for proposals from the City of Petersburg for redevelopment of the Halifax Triangle.

There was discussion among City Council Members.

Council Member Wilson-Smith made a substitute motion to table action until the next City Council meeting. The motion was seconded by Council Member Coleman. The motion was approved on roll call. On roll call vote, voting yes: Coleman, Hart, Hill, Wilson-Smith, Parham and Myers; Voting No: Moore

- c. Consideration to authorize the City Treasurer to publish Delinquent Taxpayers List.

**BACKGROUND:** Virginia Code §§58.1-3921 – 58.1-3924 gives the City Treasurer the authority to create delinquent taxpayer lists and gives the local governing body authority to publish such lists, or parts of the list as deemed advisable by the Treasurer, in the local newspaper.

**RECOMMENDATION:** The City Treasurer recommends that the City Council give the City Treasurer authorization to publish the delinquent taxpayers list in the local newspaper as soon as possible.

Council Member Coleman made a motion to authorize the City Treasurer to publish the delinquent taxpayers list in the local newspaper as soon as possible. **BACKGROUND:** A hearing to permit the purchase of this property was held on January 19, 2016. City Council gave the City Manager the authorization to negotiate the selling price of 125 W. Washington Street and to report back for the permit to sell. The negotiated price of the property is \$100,000.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Staff recommends City Council to accept the price and permit the purchase of 125 W. Washington Street.

Virginia's Gateway Region includes the Cities of Colonial Heights, Hopewell and Petersburg, and the Counties of Chesterfield, Dinwiddie, Prince George, Surry and Sussex.

Each member jurisdiction appoints one (1) local elected official and one (1) local business representative to the Board of Directories. Both Mayor Myers and Winston Saunders have indicated their desire to represent the City on the Board.

**BACKGROUND:** Petersburg Area Transit (PAT) has been awarded \$80,000 from the Virginia Department of Mineral, Mines and Energy (DMME) to support the advancement of alternative transportation bi-fuel technology. Under this large-scale initiative, public and private fleet vehicles are converted to propane autogas in order to reduce vehicle emissions, displace gasoline consumption. Propane autogas, also referred to as liquefied petroleum gas (LPG), is the most widely used alternative fuel in the world, with more than 17 million autogas vehicles on the roads today. PAT worked with Alliance Autogas/Blossman Gas and DMME on this opportunity, which has supported a variety of alternative fuel projects across the Commonwealth. DMME is supported on Alternative Fuels/Vehicles initiatives by Virginia Clean Cities (VCC)/ James Madison University. The Clean Cities program is sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy in accordance with the Energy Policy Act of 1992, to reduce dependence on imported petroleum products, by promoting the use of alternative fuels and vehicles use in the transportation sector.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Recommend City Council adopts the actions to move forward to appropriate \$80,000 in state and federal funds.

**REASON:** In accordance with the Code of Virginia, a public hearing must be held prior to amendments to the Code of the City of Petersburg.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Recommend City Council schedule a public hearing on April 19, 2016.

**BACKGROUND:** The city has grown over the last decade in the Downtown area, with numerous new merchants, residential living and businesses. As a result, the Police Department has realized an increase in complaints related to violations of the parking limits and restrictions on a regular basis. First, due to the growth of tourism and greater volume of visitors from outside of the city of Petersburg, it is recommended that the city allow for an additional 5 days to remit payment of parking fines. Second, driving over city curbs to park on either private or public property have increased causing damage and resulting in expensive repair costs to the city. Therefore, it is recommended that the city include, as a violation for city code 110-265, driving over a city curb to park on private or public property shall result in a \$40.00 fine; and the fine will double if not paid or contested within 10 business days. Finally, the city also shall increase fines associated with parking citations as indicated in the ordinance proposal. Increased fines will assist in the reduction of violations and will more closely reflect those costs associated with enforcement.

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 110, TRAFFIC VEHICLES, ARTICLE VII, SECTION 110-265, TO INCREASE THE FEE OF PARKING VIOLATIONS, AND TO EXTEND THE TIME FRAME TO PAY PENALTY; OF THE 2000 CODE OF THE CITY OF PETERSBURG, AS AMENDED.**

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**BE IT ORDAINED**, by the City Council of the City of Petersburg as follows:

That Section 110-265, of Article VII, Chapter 110, of the Code of the City of Petersburg (2000) (as amended) is hereby amended and re-ordained, as follows:

**Sec. 110-265. - Duty of officers with respect to parking violations; issuance, payment, contest, etc., of parking citations; penalty for failure to respond to citation.**

- (a) Whenever any motor vehicle is found parked or stopped in violation of any of the restrictions imposed by, or pursuant to, state law, an ordinance of this City or the rules, regulations, restrictions or prohibitions made, adopted or imposed, by the traffic and transportation safety commission or the traffic engineer, the officer or other persons appointed by the city manager to enforce this article, in addition to the regular police officers of the City, finding such vehicle, shall take its registration number, and may take any other information displayed on the vehicle which may identify its user, and shall conspicuously affix to such vehicle a written citation, in writing, on a form provided by the City, ~~for the driver to appear to answer to the charge against him within five ten days, during the hours and at a place specified in the citation.~~ Such driver may, within such period of five ten days, pay to the City Treasurer, in person, or by mailing a check or money order, as a penalty for, and in full satisfaction of, such violation, the sum of ~~\$12.00~~ 20.00; . If the fine is not paid within the ten days to the City Treasurer, the fine will double. ~~except that~~ The amount of such penalty for the violation of the ordinances or regulations relating to overtime parking shall be the sum of \$5.00 \$20.00; the amount of such penalty for the violation of the ordinances or regulations relating to parking within 15 feet of fire hydrants and in fire lanes shall be ~~\$40.00~~ 50.00; and, in special spaces reserved for disabled persons the penalty shall be the sum of ~~\$100.00~~ 150.00. Such payment shall constitute a plea of guilty of the violation in question. Parking on or driving over a city curb to park on private or public property shall be a \$50.00 fine.
- (b c) Any person who shall desire to contest a parking citation, shall present this citation at the Office of the City Treasurer, who shall certify it, on an appropriate form, to the general district court within 10 days. ~~If payment or presentment of such citation for certification to the general district court is not postmarked or received by the city treasurer within five ten~~



days after receipt of such citation, the violator shall be subject to payment of double the penalty as provided in this section.

(e-d)The failure of such owner to make such payment or present such citation to the City Treasurer for certification to the general district court shall, within 30 days after receipt of such citation, render such violator subject to the penalty provided in section 110-31.

*Overtime parking* means a vehicle that remains parked in such parking space beyond the parking limit, as indicated by the parking sign, such vehicle shall be considered as parked overtime and the parking of a vehicle overtime in any part of a street where any such sign is located shall be unlawful.

**BACKGROUND:** The property is currently vacant, but was last used as a retail store by Petersburg Pickers. The property has been used over the years as a tire shop and an automotive repair shop, sometimes associated with a dealership and other times independent of the dealer. The applicant currently operates his business in a neighboring locality operating off of a temporary home occupation permit. The applicant has to find a location other than his home to operate his business. This property was rezoned in 2012 to the B-2 zoning designation to allow the continued use of the subject property, mid-twentieth century buildings for automotive related uses. The interior of the building is designed for this type of use with several floor lifts. There are currently 5 bay doors on Bollingbrook Street, 2 bay doors on the South side of the building and 4 bay doors on the East side of the building. A special use permit is required for this type of use in this district.

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**PURPOSE:** Hold a public hearing to receive citizen comment on the proposed uses of Community Development Block Grant funds for FY2016-2017.

**REASON:** The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires that a public hearing be held before Council takes legislative action on the proposed uses of CDBG funds.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Following a duly advertised public hearing, Council may affirm Staff's recommendation; make changes to staff's recommendations or table for further consideration.

**BACKGROUND:** Petersburg, Virginia is an entitlement jurisdiction for the annual receipt of CDBG funds from HUD. This requires the submission of the Consolidated and Annual Plan for the proposed uses of the funds to be received in FY2016-2017. Funds may be used to address one or more of the three national objectives for the program: Benefit of low and moderate income persons, aid in the Prevention or removal of blight or urgent needs.

On the local level a request must fall within one or more of the priorities established by City Council to be considered for funding. The local priorities are:

**1<sup>st</sup> Priority** - City projects that support the City's Revitalization Strategy for the stabilization and/or enhancement of its residential and commercial environments and may encourage further investment by others. These projects may include infrastructure projects/drainage, streets and roadway improvements, sidewalks, curb & gutter, and streetscapes, residential rehabilitation and others.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Priority** - Public facilities that support the City's Revitalization Strategy for the stabilization and/or enhancement of residential and/or commercial environments and may encourage further investment by others. These may include facilities owned by private not for profit agencies open to the public. These may include recreation centers, tennis courts, ball fields, museums, theaters, health clinics and others. This category does not include program activities which may be operated at these locations.

**3<sup>rd</sup> Priority** - Planning activities of a general planning nature which is not directly related to a project, such as a playground, recreation center or any capital project. This category would include strategic planning, preparation of a comprehensive plan, neighborhood plans, commercial development plans, visioning plans, revitalization plans and others. Planning activities are subject to the HUD statutory 20% cap for administration & planning. Because the City uses most of these funds for administration, little is available for this purpose.

Project related planning is eligible as a project cost, but must be specific such as planning for the development of a playground or neighborhood center. Because eligibility is based on the end use of the funds, planning for a project, in and of itself, is not eligible unless the project is built or constructed.

**4<sup>th</sup> Priority** – Public Services which may include City or private non-profit services to low and moderate income persons or families. These may include services for the elderly, youth, the homeless and others. This category is subject to the HUD 15% cap. In addition, because the City’s costs for administration and planning is capped at 20% this policy applies to the use of funds for public services as well. In addition, these funds are not available on an ongoing operational basis.



**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 50, ENVIRONMENT, ARTICLE V, SECTIONS 50-111, 50-116 AND 50-131, REMOVING THE TERM CASH ESCROW FROM EACH SECTION; OF THE 2000 CODE OF THE CITY OF PETERSBURG, AS AMENDED.**

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**BE IT ORDAINED**, by the City Council of the City of Petersburg as follows:

That Section 50-111, 50-116, and 50-131, of Article V, Chapter 50, of the Code of the City of Petersburg (2000) (as amended) is hereby amended and re-ordained, as follows:

**Sec. 50-111. - Monitoring and inspections.**

- a) The administrator or any duly authorized agent of the administrator (engineering technician/project inspector) shall inspect the land-disturbing activity during construction for:
  - (1) Compliance with the approved erosion and sediment control plan;
  - (2) Compliance with the approved stormwater management plan;
  - (3) Development, updating, and implementation of a pollution prevention plan; and
  - (4) Development and implementation of any additional control measures necessary to address a TMDL.
- (b) The administrator or any duly authorized agent of the administrator (engineering technician/project inspector) may, at reasonable times and under reasonable circumstances, enter any establishment or upon any property, public or private, for the purpose of obtaining information or conducting surveys or investigations necessary in the enforcement of the provisions of this article.
- (c) In accordance with a performance bond with surety, ~~cash escrow~~, letter of credit, any combination thereof, or such other legal arrangement or instrument, the administrator may also enter any establishment or upon any property, public or private, for the purpose of initiating or maintaining appropriate actions which are required by the permit conditions associated with a land-disturbing activity when a permittee, after proper notice, has failed to take acceptable action within the time specified.
- (d) Pursuant to § 62.1-44.15:40 of the Code of Virginia, the administrator may require every VSMP authority permit applicant or permittee, or any such person subject to VSMP authority permit requirements under this article, to furnish when requested such application



materials, plans, specifications, and other pertinent information as may be necessary to determine the effect of his discharge on the quality of state waters, or such other information as may be necessary to accomplish the purposes of this article.

- (e) Post-construction inspections of stormwater management facilities required by the provisions of this article shall be conducted by the administrator or any duly authorized agent of the administrator (engineering technician/project inspector) pursuant to the locality's adopted and state board approved inspection program, and shall occur, at minimum, at least once every five years except as may otherwise be provided for in section 50-110.

**Sec. 50-116. - Performance bond. (9VAC25-870-104.D and Code § 62.1-44.15:34(A))**

Prior to issuance of any permit, the applicant shall be required to submit a reasonable performance bond with surety, ~~cash-escrow~~, letter of credit, any combination thereof, or such other legal arrangement acceptable to the city attorney, to ensure that measures could be taken by the City of Petersburg at the applicant's expense should he fail, after proper notice, within the time specified to initiate or maintain appropriate actions which may be required of him by the permit conditions as a result of his land disturbing activity. If the City of Petersburg takes such action upon such failure by the applicant, the city may collect from the applicant for the difference should the amount of the reasonable cost of such action exceed the amount of the security held, if any. Within 60 days of the completion of the requirements of the permit conditions, such bond, ~~cash-escrow~~, letter of credit or other legal arrangement, or the unexpended or unobligated portion thereof, shall be refunded to the applicant or terminated.

All applicants for permits pursuant to section 50-130 of this article shall, at the time of permit application, provide to the city a performance bond, ~~cash-escrow~~, or an irrevocable letter of credit in a form acceptable to the city attorney, to support the cost of measures necessarily undertaken by the city as a result of the applicant's failure to initiate or maintain appropriate conservation measures required of him as a result of his land-disturbing activity. No land-disturbing permit shall be valid until an approved bond has been provided in accordance with this section.
- (b) Bond amount. The amount of the bond or other security for performance shall not exceed the total of (i) the estimated cost to initiate and maintain appropriate conservation action based on unit price for new public or private sector construction in the locality, and (ii) a reasonable allowance for estimated administrative costs and inflation, which shall not exceed 25 percent of the cost of the conservation action. Should it be necessary for the city to take such conservation action, the city may collect from the applicant any costs in excess of the amount of the surety held.



- (c) Refund or termination of bond. Within 60 days of adequate stabilization in any project or section of a project, as determined by the administrator, such bond, ~~cash escrow~~ or letter of credit, or the unexpended or unobligated portion thereof shall be either refunded to the applicant or terminated, based upon the percentage of stabilization accomplished in the project or project section. The owner or permittee shall provide written notice to the administrator of completion of any project.

## City Manager's Report

Council Meeting April 5, 2016

**a. Consider the Farmer's Market original location and plans for expansion if necessary to reclaim vendors who departed in the last year.**

The Petersburg Farmers Market moved to 125 E. Washington Street in November; a very visible location off of exit 52 in the heart of downtown Petersburg. The Office of Economic Development is working with a variety of community partners and funding agencies to create new resources and programs to support the Petersburg Farmers Market. **b. Is there a plan to develop existing housing properties rather than acting on new development?**

Yes, there are goals and focus areas in the updated Master Plan for direct efforts and resources. The City can also utilize its tools through Code Enforcement to require existing property owners to maintain and fix up their properties. The City cannot require anything above what the code states is necessary for the safe occupancy of the housing. Our development



efforts targets the neighborhoods but not specific properties.

**c. Can the City consider a volunteer program to help enforce illegal parking in handicap spaces to include a certification for photographers to help prosecute violators?**

The Mayor has addressed the possibility of this program with the Acting City Manager, Police Chief and Acting City Attorney.

**d. Will there be a review of salaries for those making over \$100,000 as a result of raises realized in the past few years?**

No review will be done as a result of the raises; however, based upon FY 17 projected revenues, salaries will be revisited prior to submitting the FY 17 budget.

**e. Will the City website be updated?**

Updates are currently being made to the website.

**f. What is the payment plan for the school system?**

As funds are available, our practice has been to allocate one twelfth of the total appropriated funds due from the City to Petersburg Public Schools monthly.



**g. Can Cameron field be revamped?**

Presently, there are no plans to rehabilitate Cameron Field. Physical Improvements to parks are based on funding (grants, general fund, or CIP).

**h. What is the plan to hire a new City Manager to include advertising, use of a consultant and citizen input?**

No deliberations have been made at this time, but will be forthcoming.
