



A Life-Changing Journey

“It was unexpected . . . 47 years old with prostate cancer. Other than going to the bathroom more at night, I had no symptoms,” said Mayor Sam Parham.

During annual check-ups, Mayor Parham’s doctor noticed a concerning rise in his PSA levels, prompting further testing. These additional tests revealed that the Mayor had developed two types of aggressive cancer in both the upper and lower regions of his prostate.

“The first thing you think about is your family. You think about your wife and daughter. My daughter was 13, and I’m saying, ‘Wow, if I don’t treat it, I may not see her graduate from high school.’ That put life in perspective for me.”

“Sam had just left the doctor’s office, and I was at work. He called me. I lost my breath for a minute . . . I went through this with my father, who had prostate cancer . . . I was his caregiver, and through my father’s treatment, I met Sam,” said Maytee (MY) Parham, Sam’s wife and Petersburg Clerk of Circuit Court.

Mayor Parham and MY explored all available treatments, consulted with many doctors, weighed all possible side effects, and made an informed decision. That decision was the removal of the entire prostate.

“With prostate cancer, impotence is at the forefront of any man’s mind,” said MY. “That was part of understanding the different types of treatment and the best treatment. The choice Sam made was there would be a small chance of impotence and the spread of cancer. For him, that was the right choice.”

“When I went in for surgery, MY took my phone; she said ‘I got this now.’ She shut everything down. ‘He’s got to rest.’ I remember her saying to others, ‘You’ll have to figure it out.’ That was a very important time because we took vows when we got married, and we promised in sickness and in health. When the sickness comes, it’s like, wow, it’s amazing to have MY here.”

Following surgery came recovery, and for Mayor Parham, slowing down from his life of public service and heading his family’s business brought new discoveries.

“I had this procedure right before Christmas. Typically, Christmas is a blur for me. By staying home, I could see things I had never noticed during Christmas. I would say to MY, ‘This is pretty.’ And she would tell me, ‘Oh, that’s been there for years.’ Looking at the Christmas tree was humbling for me. It made me appreciate the small things that I probably would have missed. The support that MY gave me was so important because you have to realize the surgery is just the beginning of the journey.”

“Going through this made me understand that we are only here for a little while and that things in your life can change in the blink of an eye. You can go from being the strongest person on earth to the weakest and most vulnerable. And because of that, having family by my side to emotionally push me through has been a big part of the healing process.”

More than eight months later, Mayor Parham says he is cancer-free and at 85% full recovery. He wants to share his journey and the importance of early detection with others.



“By having prostate cancer and talking publicly about it, I have been approached by so many men and families who are going through the same thing, and they are scared. Bringing these conversations forward is difficult but needed. In Petersburg, we have challenges with health disparities, and early detection and health education are so important. The more we can talk about health and for me to show people that, ‘Hey, I’m vulnerable just like you,’ I hope this can help toward more positive health outcomes. It’s not right to be quiet when this is such a silent killer.”

“We need to talk more about health as families. My son now knows this is something in the family and needs to stay on top of it as he gets older. I want people to know that there is life on the other side, but don’t take it for granted and not go to the doctor to make sure that you are safe.”

“Cancer is not a death sentence,” explained MY. “There are ways to cope and understand. And there’s a community out there to help you.”

“Going through this journey together has made me appreciate my life much more,” said Mayor Parham. “I want to say to MY that I love you, thank you, and look forward to the rest of our lives together.”

Petersburg has the highest rate of prostate cancer deaths in Virginia

National Statistics

- 5-year survival rate is 97.5%
- 12.9% of men will be diagnosed at some point in their lives
- New cases: 116.5 per 100,000 men of all races per year, however the rate is considerably higher for African American men at 183.4 per 100,000
- The American Cancer Society recommends men begin screening for prostate cancer at 50 and by 45 if there is family history.

Rolling Strong for 75 Years in Petersburg



In 1949, the Whitfield family established Amsted Rail's Brenco® Bearings in Petersburg, producing bronze journal bearings for railroad freight cars. A decade later, Brenco achieved a significant milestone by obtaining conditional approval from the American Association of Railroads for its now-famous product in the global railroad sector - the tapered roller bearing. These bearings are essential for ensuring train wheels' smooth and efficient rotation while supporting substantial loads during travel.

Brenco dominates the market in the United States and is a global bearing supplier. "From our Petersburg facility, we ship bearings to Australia, India, China, Ukraine, and South America," explained Michael Mason, General Manager and Vice President of Operations.

This year marks Brenco's 75th year in Petersburg. Brenco, an anchor industry in the City, has employed thousands of local workers throughout the decades. The company promotes a workplace environment where loyalty and dedication are valued

and rewarded. This is best exemplified by Brenco continuing to be an Employee Stock Ownership Plan (ESOP) company, meaning employees receive company stock as part of their compensation.

Today, Brenco employs around 300 people. Many employees are long-term residents who have been living and working here for decades. "Brenco has stayed in Petersburg because we have a stable market with stable people," said Cathee Andrews, Director of Human Resources. "You don't find companies today that have the tenure we have. Finding the right people with the right talent has been instrumental in Brenco's success for 75 years. We have people who genuinely care about our organization and are loyal."

One of those many loyal employees is Charles "Chip" Nesmith. He has worked for Brenco for 52 years. "I couldn't think of another place I would like to work," said Nesmith. "There's something new every day, something different."

"Today, I see the same opportunities I saw when I first came here. I saw opportunities to learn about things I didn't know anything about. If you work hard, you're going to be rewarded. That value is still at Brenco."

"What's kept Brenco in Petersburg all these years is the people," said Michael Mason.

We're able to find the talent we need. And as long as we continue to find that talent and great people, Brenco will stay here."

Cathee Andrews has been with Brenco for over three decades. She started as a temp employee, left, and then returned. "I got a phone call offering me a full-time job. So, I returned with the sole purpose of taking advantage of the tuition reimbursement program. I was young and could not afford to go to college. So, I thought I would probably leave as soon as I got my degree. I won't want to work for some manufacturing company for the rest of my life. Fast forward 34 years later, I'm still here. I earned my degree, and Brenco paid my tuition. The people are what makes this company such a fun place to work. There's not been a day that I've dreaded coming to work."

"Anyone can apply here, whether you have a degree or not. Brenco still has the same tuition reimbursement program. We've had a big push lately on the importance of skills trades."

"We have that family atmosphere here," said Michael Mason. "We hand out turkeys and hams and have family days. We watch out for each other."

"Brenco has a fantastic Park," said Andrews. "What employer in the area has a park with a swimming pool and a beautiful

pavilion that our employees can enjoy with their families.”

“I think the number of challenges keeps many people here,” said Mason. “We’re a vertically integrated business where we’re not focused on just one thing. If you are interested in one area, change your mind, and then want to move to a different manufacturing process area, you can. I started at Brenco as a young, curious engineer. And I think everything we do here keeps you interested in the job.”

Chip Nesmith said he is often asked why he likes Brenco. “I tell people that Brenco bought me two houses, sent my three kids to college, bought my groceries every week, and I can’t tell you the number of cars they have bought me. I can’t think of any other company that does that.”

Will Brenco remain in Petersburg for another 75 years? “Petersburg has been good for us because it’s a good location, with 95 right here,” said Mason. “You have access to good workers. Petersburg is business-friendly because of all the investment it’s putting into the area. Petersburg’s downtown is changing, and the infrastructure is improving, which helps our business. And it’s appealing to folks to move into the area and help us produce bearings.”

Petersburg thanks Brenco for its commitment and service as a premier employer and community partner over the past 75 years. Throughout its journey, Brenco has provided valuable employment opportunities and enriched the lives of thousands of families while advancing economic growth and stability within Petersburg and the region. Petersburg Fire Support 6 - Our Heroes



Heroes in Service: Petersburg Fire Support 6 started in 2017 when retired Fire Sergeant Gene Beemer drove past Petersburg firefighters responding to a fire. Beemer realized the firefighters had been there for some time, so he stopped to speak with the Fire Chief and ask if there was anything he could do to help. The Chief asked Beemer to bring them snacks and drinks, which Beemer did. Following the fire, conversations began between retired firefighter Robert Puryear, who was inspired by Beemer's story, and the Fire Chief regarding continuous support for Petersburg's first responders. All agreed, and Puryear brought together a group of six volunteers to start Petersburg Fire Support 6 and became president of this non-profit organization. Later, Petersburg Fire & Rescue provided them with a bay in Station 6, also known as Fort Cross.

For the past seven years, Petersburg Fire Support 6, or as firefighters like to refer to them, "Seal Team 6," has provided essential support services to all Tri-City first responders. "We provide tents, chairs, fans, heaters, ice, food, water, and other re-



freshments for our first responders," said Puryear. "During the summer months, we set up tents then blow the cool air from our fans into the tents to provide the first responders with a comfortable rest environment." Puryear also expressed how some calls the first responders must address can take ten or more hours and that first responders do not usually have adequate food or water with them. So, Support 6 steps up and ensures they are equipped with relief supplies.

Heroes in Commitment: When speaking about the volunteers' careers, Puryear highlighted that "all our volunteers have first responder experience, and most of us are between the ages of sixty and eighty. We have former police officers, firefighters, and

other EMS professionals in our ranks, and some of our volunteers' spouses work with us, too." In response to what keeps them committed and motivated to continue helping the community, Beemer expressed "You can leave firefighting, but firefighting never leaves you."

Heroes Throughout: The Petersburg Fire Support 6 members chose to serve the community in their careers and continue to serve through their volunteering endeavors. Many volunteers of the Petersburg Fire Support 6 expressed that while they are responding to a fire, rookie firefighters often seek their advice on how to best handle the more difficult situations. Thus, this organization not only provides relief services, but also extends invaluable mentoring to new firefighters.

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month

According to the American Cancer Society, one in eight women will be diagnosed with breast cancer during their lifetime. The median age of diagnosis is 62. Early detection is key. Breast cancer is sometimes found after symptoms appear, but many women with breast cancer have no symptoms. This is why regular breast cancer screening is so important.

The following American Cancer Society recommendations apply to women of average risk:

- **Women between 40 and 44** have the option to start screening with a mammogram every year.
- **Women 45 to 54** should get mammograms every year.



- **Women 55 and older** can switch to a mammogram every other year or choose to continue yearly mammograms. Screening should continue if a woman is in good health and expected to live at least ten more years.

ARTICLE X. Taxation and Finance.

Section 6-A. Property tax exemption for; certain veterans and their surviving spouses and; surviving spouses of soldiers killed in action who died in the line of duty. Yes or No

Petersburg City Public Schools welcomes Interim Superintendent Yolonda C. Brown and her new 100-Day Priority Plan that outlines key areas:

1. Engage Stakeholders, Foster Relationships, and Build Trust
2. Reinforce Teaching, Learning, and Performance
3. Evaluate Division Leadership Capacity
4. Assess Division Finances, Operations, and Facilities

5. Analyze Student and Staff Safety and Wellbeing

These priorities are set to improve the school division's performance by uniting stakeholders, enriching leadership, and nurturing excellence among educators and learners.

Action steps for these priorities include:

- Conducting a public perception survey to grasp community needs
- Assessing curriculum alignment with standards and student outcomes
- Addressing leadership vacancies through structured recruitment

- Collaborating with the Board and VDOE for department audits
- Improving feedback mechanisms for students, staff, and parents to enhance school climate and safety



An Update from Planning and Community Development

With a fully staffed team of nine, to include Community Development Block Grant administration, zoning and zoning enforcement, historic preservation, and planning staff, the Planning and Community Development team has been working on several projects to realize the community's vision as captured in the recently adopted Comprehensive Plan 2044 - <https://tinyurl.com/PetersburgPlan>.

Some of the highlights include: A grant award of over \$400,000 to install three bus shelters along Crater Road and 30 benches with canopies (pictured here) throughout the city with associated access improvements.



Fully funded participation in the Community Forest Revitalization Program through the Department of Forestry to create tree regulations as well as a tree master plan for the city of Petersburg to include the selection of two communities for a focused planting effort. The Department has kicked off its Zoning and Subdivision Ordinance Update. These ordinances guide the shape of development in the community such as how tall your house can be or if you can open a business on a particular property. Ordinance updates can help implement many of the Comprehensive Plan's strategies like supporting diverse housing options, increasing safety through design, and promoting compatible development. Several new policies have been adopted through text amendments to the Zoning Ordinance, including allowing sandwich board signs on public sidewalks, permitting certain noncomplying structures to be used for the purpose they were built, and introducing new standards for architectural treatment of new construction, site plan review, and recreational substance retail uses in the City.

To Keep in Mind

Historic Districts: If you are completing work on your historic home, you will need approval from the Architectural Review Board (ARB) for ANY exterior improvements. You can find out if your home is in a local historic district here: <https://tinyurl.com/LocalHistoric> and find the application to go before the ARB here: <https://tinyurl.com/ARBHistoric>.

Zoning Permits: The Planning Department is now requiring permits for certain items to confirm zoning compliance, including fences, sign refacing, and accessory structures less than 257 square feet.

Sign Fact Sheet

When and How to Apply
Sign Permits are required before you erect, structurally alter, relocate, or replace any sign within the City. If you're planning to install a sign, it's essential to understand the process for obtaining a sign permit. The following steps will guide you through the application procedure:

Steps to Sign Permits

- 1 See if your Sign is Allowed**
Signs of certain types are prohibited. There are also limits to signage size in certain districts. Please see the Sign Ordinance at Article 21 Section 6 for Prohibited Signs
- 2 See which Signs Don't Require a Permit**
Most signs need permits; however, some select signs do not. Please see the Sign Ordinance at Article 21 Section 5 for exemptions.
- 3 Fill out a Sign Permit**
You will need to know the type, size, location, and materials of each sign. Sign permits can be found on the City website under the Planning Tab or by using the Search function.

NEW Ordinance
Effective April 10th, 2024, sandwich board signs are now legal. Please contact the Planning office to receive a FREE permit.



Amazon EBT Program

Who is eligible to use SNAP EBT on Amazon?

Amazon is part of a pilot run by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) to accept SNAP EBT online. Currently, customers with a valid SNAP EBT card can use their SNAP funds on Amazon. They accept SNAP EBT nationwide.

How do I sign up to use my SNAP EBT benefits on Amazon?

To use your SNAP EBT card, visit www.amazon.com/snap and follow the instructions on the screen. If you are not already an Amazon customer, you will need to create an account. There are also opportunities to add an EBT card during checkout or in your wallet.

Do I need a Prime membership to use my SNAP EBT card on Amazon?

No. Shopping with a valid SNAP EBT card issued by an eligible state allows you to access Amazon Fresh and Whole Foods Market on Amazon without Amazon Prime.

Want the benefits of a Prime Membership? Income-verified and SNAP, Medicaid, or other qualifying government assistance recipients can save more with Prime Access, a reduced cost membership which is \$6.99/month.
